OUR MISSION

Our mission is to restore dignity and enrich the lives of Syrian refugees and other vulnerable families by providing innovative education opportunities and critical humanitarian aid via our flagship program, The Azraq Education Center, in the town of South Azraq, Jordan.

WHAT WE DO

The Azraq Education and Community Fund (AECF) provides opportunities for refugee and vulnerable families to create a sense of normalcy and better their lives after experiencing tremendous hardships over these last years of conflict. In the face of an enormous humanitarian crisis, we focus our efforts in the small, rural town of South Azraq, Jordan where nearly half of the town population today are refugees. This community is underserved by large, mainstream aid organizations and AECF provides meaningful contributions to directly better their lives.

OUR MOST IMPACTEUL YEAR YET

A Letter from the Executive Director

In our seventh year as a non-profit organization, AECF achieved major milestones and had our most impactful year yet. Our commitment to refugee and vulnerable families in Jordan is stronger than ever, and we've refined and strengthened our approach to meet student and family needs, becoming a true pillar for the South Azraq community.

Last Fall, we achieved a years-long dream of moving into a permanent space to host our education program. The new building delivers! The larger classrooms, outdoor space, full kitchen and more has allowed us to stretch our wings and explore new avenues of creativity and knowledge to enrich students' lives.

Nothing warms my heart more than seeing our whole school community gathered each morning to share announcements, performances, and a little exercise surrounded by our beautiful building, student-run garden, and team of loving staff.

We are watching our students grow up and this year we expanded our programs to support 11th and 12th graders as they work to graduate high school and pass the challenging Tawjihi (high school equivalency) exam. We look forward to continuing to support these teens as they seek post-secondary programs and follow their dreams.

We made it a priority this year to expand partnerships with local and international organizations, and use our new space as a base for host other partner programs. We created murals with a team from Seattle, hosted open medical days for all with a team of Jordanian and International doctors and nurses, invested in our teachers through training programs in Amman, and helped secure scholarships for youth to attend the largest technical college in Jordan.

We have a lot of work ahead. As our students grow up, we face high drop-out rates and few opportunities to advance our kids through university programs. The economic realities of 2022 are impossible to ignore as the cost of living rises exponentially while international aid for the most vulnerable families dwindles. But our community is strong and we are proud to be supported by YOU, our most generous supporters, many of whom have been with us since our humble beginnings in 2015.

Onwards and upwards for a peaceful and healthy 2023!

ADDRESSING THE NEED

Access to quality education for Syrian refugees is a high priority across Jordan and particularly in rural communities like Azraq. Jordan's two-shift school system has weakened the overall education sector with condensed school days and many new or inexperienced teachers in the classroom. This was exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. UNICEF reported that 26% of Syrian students didn't access Government distance learning programs throughout nearly two full years of school closures due to lack of internet, guidance, or awareness.

The need to enhance public school education exists across all ages and grades, but is especially critical between seventh and eighth grade levels, when school enrollment drops drastically among Syrian refugee students. UNICEF found that only 15% of 16-year-olds and 21% of 17-year-olds were enrolled in secondary school, as compared to more than 80% of Jordanian children of both ages.

Severe poverty is the largest factor impacting high dropout rates among Syrian refugees. Only 2% of Syrian refugee households can meet their essential food needs without negative coping strategies. Students often leave the classroom early to earn wages to provide essentials for their families, and early marriage is encouraged among teenage girls to decrease the number of dependents at home.

The academic interventions provided by The Azraq Education Center, along with wraparound support services for students and parents designed to increase the value of educational attainment and address potential barriers, are necessary to prevent this population of Syrian refugee youth from becoming a lost generation.

PROGRAM PILLARS

Founded in 2014, the Azraq Education Center hosts more than 400 students starting at age 3, providing daily enriching and impactful education programming.

MONTESSORI-INSPIRED EARLY EDUCATION

Montessori-trained teachers lead our youngest students, ages 3-5, in innovative, peer-to-peer learning in a Montessori-inspired environment.





O2 REMEDIAL ADVANCEMENT CLASSES

Remedial Arabic, English, Science, and Math courses help students from Grades 1 to 10 catch up with their peers in Government School.

O3 POST-SECONDARY PREP

Test preparation for the Tawjihi Exam, as well as mentorship support, assist our 11th and 12th graders in remaining in school, graduating, and pursuing vocational or post-secondary programs





ENRICHMENT PROGRAMMING

Art, sports, theater, field trips, gardening, and other programs encourage students to pursue their interests, remain curious, and develop leadership skills.

O 5 WRAPAROUND SUPPORT SERVICES

Regular food aid, emergency medical support, and referral pathways ensure that all families' pasic needs are met.

98% of our team is from South Azraq, and the majority are women, in a community where unemployment is high and women make up less than 10% of the workforce.



A FOCUS ON TEENS

A NEW AFTERNOON SHIFT

A key 2022 priority was increasing our student body of teenagers (particularly boys) and supporting them in their efforts to stay in school and sit for the Jordanian Tawjihi exam. By rolling out a new afternoon shift, we met our goal and added 50 teenage boys, and an additional 18 Tawjihi-level boys and girls to the program.

We launched with three days per week of Math, English, Arabic and Sports for grade 5 to grade 11, but due to the program success, we've now expanded to five days per week for 2023!



PREPPING FOR TAWJIHI

Tawjihi requires specialized teachers familiar with the level and test-style of the subject on the exam. However, in rural areas like South Azraq, it is difficult to find teachers with the appropriate skill-set and experience.

To meet this need, the Center subscribes and provides access to the Watad online learning platform. Watad offers semester-long Tawjihi prep courses with specialized professors in specific test subjects, available by laptop or smartphone.

Our Tawjihi-level students, Jordanian and Syrian, come to the Center three days per week to access the Watad programs free of charge, use the internet and devices, and work in groups to listen to the lectures, complete worksheets, and prepare for the exam.



BRIDGES TO POST-SECONDARY PROGRAMS

University programs are both academically and financially difficult to access for the majority of our students. With this in mind, we worked to create relationships and referral pathways to vocational programs that teach specific skills and help create future job opportunities for Azraq youth.

This year, we enrolled our first cohort of students at Luminus Technical College, on full scholarships provided by Luminus! These seven-month programs include three months of in-class work followed by four months of paid internships to participating students.

AECF provides transportation from Azraq to Amman (approximately 90 minutes each way) to make sure that distance is not a barrier to education. Our first cohort are in HVAC repair, Esthetics, and Cosmetology courses. We look forward to seeing them complete their studies and enter the workforce!

BASKETBALL

This summer,15-year-old Cyrus from Connecticut raised funds to help build us a multi-purpose sport court at The Azraq Center. Further, he helped coordinate a one-week basketball clinic with Full Court Peace, introducing students to the sport for the very first time! Everyone loved learning to dribble and shoot hoops together and it continues to be a sport students love to play.

SOCCER

Of course, for most of our kids, soccer is their true love language! Coach Suleiman led our teenage boys to victory this Fall in the first ever Azraq soccer tournament! Six teams went head to head (including boys from the local military school and another school nearby) but only one could come home the winner.... The Azraq Center Stars!



It was a huge moment for celebration as the boys brought home their winning Tournament Cup, celebrating with ululations and a giant meal!



COMMUNITY GARDEN & LUNCH PROGRAM

Last Spring, we laid the beds for our school vegetable garden. Throughout the year, everyone works together to plant and harvest a variety of veggies including radishes, eggplants, cucumbers, lettuce, tomatoes, peppers, and an assortment of herbs. We even have an olive tree that we hope will grow enough fruit to make our own olive oil in years to come!

Everything we harvest goes directly to the kitchen where school cooks Um Ahmed and A'isha incorporate them into healthy lunches. The team develops a three-month lunch plan, considering the nutritional facts and what vegetables are in season.





FIELD TRIPS

Field trips are a great way to reward student academic achievements, while exposing kids to new places and ideas. This year, we hosted multiple field trips outside of Azraq, including visits to *Galaxy Park*, *Jerash*, *Ajloun*, *Wadi Rajeb*, *Green Land*, *the Yadoodeh Zoo*, and *Hussein Park*.




SUMMER CAMP


The Azraq Center operates year-round with a special, modified summer program. This year we facilitated a variety of student-run clubs throughout July and August filled with activities and exploration!
















EXCHANGE PROGRAMS

The Butterfly Project

The Azraq Center partners with Seattle-based NGO Voices of the Children, implementing arts-based exchange between Azraq students and students in Washington State.

The Butterfly Project had students create poetry, ceramics, and ultimately a three-dimensional mural for the school. Works explored the parallels between a teenage girl and a butterfly; both fragile, mysterious, beautiful, and self-sufficient.



The Wind Poems

Students crafted poetry to inscribe on rice paper. It was then decorated with colorful yarn and artistically assembled with beads and bells.

Members of VOTC will present the same project in Washington classrooms, with selected poems translated into both English and Arabic to make the connection. Through pictures, videos, and some of the actual poems, the children are able to communicate cross-culturally through their art and poetry. Before the wind carries their messages away, installations in Washington and Azrag will share their voices.

SUPPORTING THE COMMUNITY AT LARGE

Addressing food insecurity and other challenges that create barriers to education are key pillars of our work. Throughout the year, we provide food boxes with essential items like beans, rice, oil, and whole chickens or meat, to the most vulnerable families at The Azraq Center and the larger South Azraq community.

We also partner with medical and dental service organizations throughout the year to provide assessments and treatments for the community. We are proud to use our center as a hub for programs that benefit all of Azraq.

Asayel in IT Class

"I saw that Asayel was uninterested in class and that she was not interacting with any of her peers. But I kept my attention on her, motivating and encouraging her to complete simple tasks, because, it became clear to me after sitting with her, she felt she had no real role to play in the class." - Anood, IT Teacher

As Asayel began to find her confidence, she became one of the first students to arrive at the computer lab each day, with enthusiasm saying: "I am the first one to arrive at class, and today I want to learn a new skill." The situation progressed, and she became very interested in the lessons and completing assignments. Now, she even supports her classmates who are behind in completing projects.

Asayel has applied her IT knowledge to create an interactive e-book titled *The Heritage Food of Countries*.

Jaber, Hussein and Khalaf

Three energetic and rambunctious friends, Jaber, Hussein, and Khalaf underwent a significant behavioral change after the teachers instituted a rewarding system for the good students. They began using their energy for good, such as being proactive in class and assisting the younger students or those in need.

The three friends are now aware that the entire center has a distinct educational system that they should adhere to rather than doing things their own way.

They understand that if they behave nicely, help others, and respect the teachers, others will respect them as well, and they will be rewarded for their good deeds.


